The Stained Glass Windows of St. David's, Part 6

Saint Francis Window

On Saturday, October 1, don't forget to bring your pets to the annual Blessing of the Animals. For 2005 that's the Saturday closest to the feast day of St. Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of animals. He is one of the four saints depicted in the tall narrow windows at the front of the church, flanking the altar – the man in the brown habit in the bottom part of the window on the right. The four saints were chosen to be shown in these windows because each has special meaning to this parish.

It's been said that St. Francis is the most popular saint in the world – sort of the Sara Lee of the Church, since “nobody doesn't like St. Francis.” The artist has depicted him with birds perching on him, and a fawn at his feet. Who wouldn't like a man who loved, and was loved by, animals so much? But that's not the only reason St. Francis is so revered, nor why he was chosen to be depicted here. During the 1980s, Brother Jon, a member of the Anglican Society of Saint Francis, visited our parish on several occasions. Brother Jon, dressed as you see St. Francis in the stained glass, would preach the Gospel on Sundays, using puppets to illustrate his stories. He also contributed his story-telling skills to Vacation Bible School, sometimes bringing another Franciscan friar to assist him. This relationship between Franciscan friars and our parish probably played a big part in the choice of St. Francis to be one of the saints depicted in our windows.

In each of the synoptic Gospels, there's the story of the young man who asks Jesus what is required to inherit eternal life. Jesus refers him to the Ten Commandments. But unsatisfied with the simplicity of that answer, and stating that he has obeyed them all since his childhood, he presses Jesus for what else would be needed. Reading Mark's account of this story (Mark 10:17-31), I'm sure Jesus knew where this conversation was going, because the story continues: “Jesus looked at him and loved him. ‘One thing you lack,’ he said. ‘Go, sell everything you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven. Then come, follow me.’ At this the man's face fell. He went away sad, because he had great wealth.”

Francis Bernardone, whose father was a successful international fabric merchant, was pretty popular with the other young people of early 13th century Assisi in Italy. He led a fun-filled frivolous life, spending the family wealth freely on his “posse,” to his father's continual consternation. One day, sitting in a

country chapel that was in great disrepair, Francis heard a voice telling him, “Go, Francis, and repair my house, which as you see is falling into ruin.” Initially understanding this message literally, and using more of his father's money, Francis set about the task of restoring the chapel. It took more time before Francis would give himself over to a life of complete service to God, but he did eventually do so (perhaps helped along by his father disinheriting him).



Rev. Anne Elizabeth lent me a recent biography of St. Francis, “Reluctant Saint, The Life of Francis of Assisi,” written by Donald Spoto. The story of Francis' early life and the break with his father reads like a modern tale of parent-child conflict. But it would be hard to find a present-day example of the complete dedication to a life of self-sacrifice and care for the poor that Francis later led. The figure in the stained glass looks well-nourished; but Francis wrecked his health with his dietary habits, often giving up his food for others. Once, Francis trekked from Italy to Spain barefoot in his rough rags. He even joined in the last of the Crusades, prepared – eager! – to die a martyr's death in an attempt to bring peace. The account of Francis' declining health during his final two years of life (he died at the age of 44, in the year 1226) is difficult to read. He may even have endured the onset of leprosy, since he had cared so closely for those poor unfortunates so afflicted, ever since the early days of his ministry. One aspect of this deteriorating health is the story that he was the first person whose body bore the signs of the stigmata (the appearance of wounds in his hands, feet, and side similar to those of the crucified Christ). You must look closely to see them, but the artist has included this legendary detail of the wounds in the stained glass figure's hands and feet. (The framed watercolor version of this window hangs just outside the single door at the back corner of the nave, and shows this detail better.)

I don't think Francis would like us to dwell on the ill effects of his life of self-deprivation. Unlike the rich young man in the Gospel story, he gladly pursued this life of caring for the poor. Throughout it all, he maintained the joy and fun-filled cheerfulness of his youth. He loved to sing and he composed poetry, as evidenced by the authorship credits for Hymns 400 and 593. He considered every person, every animal, and everything in nature to be his brothers and sisters. Who wouldn't love this man?

Other LAMB activities include our recent undertaking to obtain a rural site where ultimately we will build a residential center for "God's Littlest Lambs."

We continue to welcome mission teams from stateside churches, several of which have included teenagers and even a few sub-teens. It's inspiring to witness the impact serving in Honduras for even a few days or a week has on these young people. They all depart commenting this has been the most meaningful experience of their lives and one that they will never forget. Hopefully, St. David's next team(s) will include some young participants!

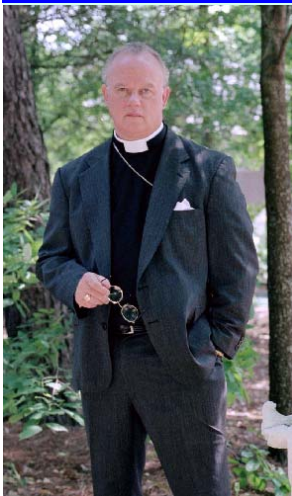

“Project REACH”- Meet the Building Committee

What is the work of the Building Committee? The Purpose and Scope of the Building Committee is to work closely with all parties in the consideration of construction and expansion of St. David's physical properties consistent with the Strategic and Master Plans adopted by the Vestry. The building committee will make recommendations to the Vestry including, but not limited to the following:

- a. The scope of work for the architectural firm
- b. The design options to be presented to the Vestry
- c. The final design
- d. The number of phases to the project
- e. The scope of Phase 1
- f. The decision to build or not to build
- g. The selection of the builder
- h. Any changes to the plan once approved

In this early stage of the project the Building Committee is meeting once each month. The co-chairs of the committee are Rick Wilson and Allen Pearson. Jan Georges is in charge of logistics. Gail Greene is the Clerk. Other Members are Fr.
